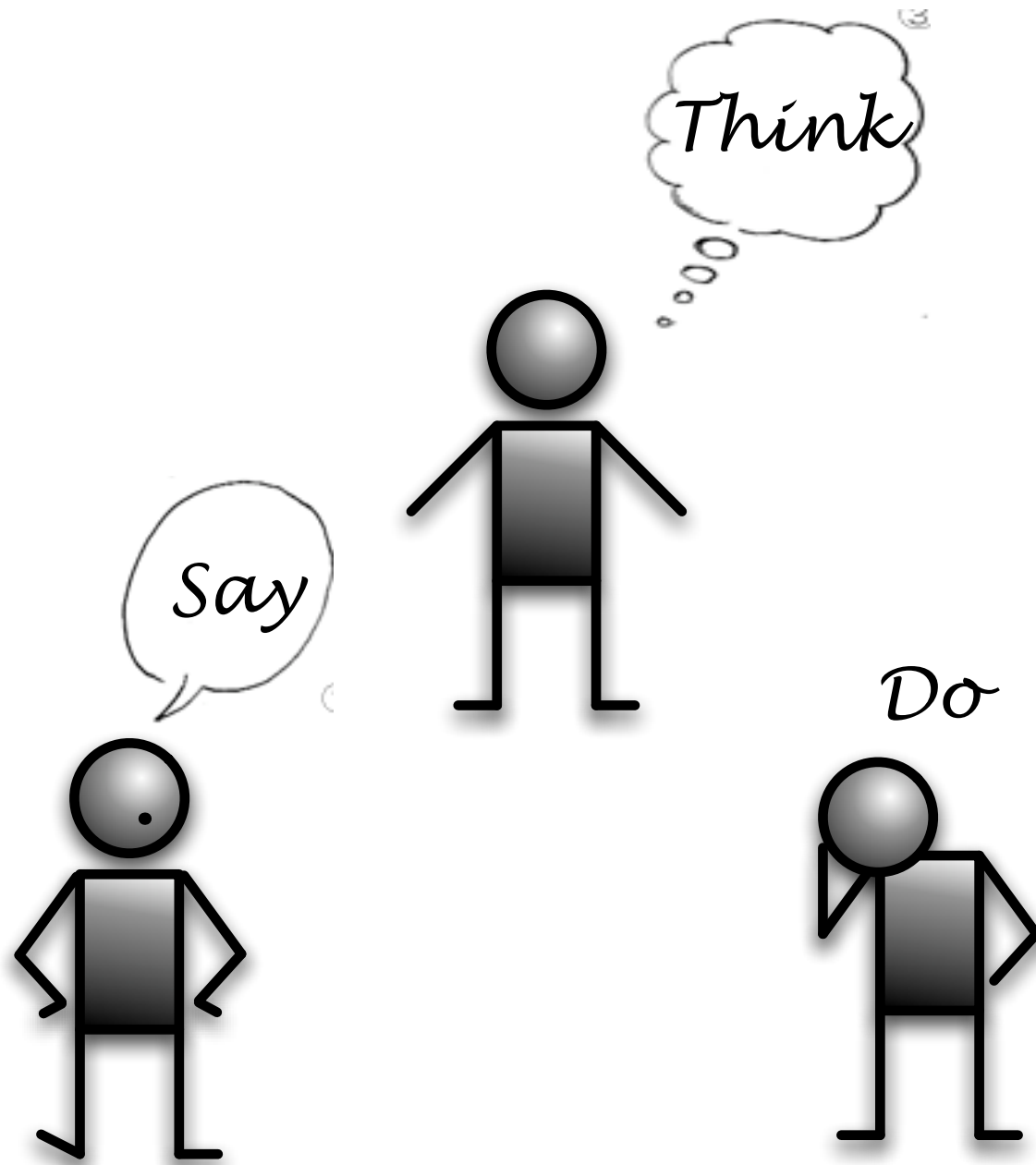

HAT 16: Disrespect

- Definition - a failure to show respect or proper regard to someone; an act of incivility, rudeness, contempt, or thoughtlessness.

HAT 16: Disrespect

- Disrespect is so common in our society today that it goes unnoticed.
- Young people think that it is cool to show disrespect and to defy authority.

HAT 16: Disrespect

- There are many ways to display disrespect.
- Rolling the eyes,
- heavy sighing,
- sticking out the tongue,
- shaking the head,
- Fake yawning,
- giving someone the finger
- Failing to stand when the flag passes by

HAT 16: Disrespect

- Talking or unnecessary movement in Bible class, movies, concerts, etc.
- Saying or doing improper in the presence of opposite sex
- Failure to show proper deference to the elderly and the infirm.
- Failure to recognize someone's station, for example, "Mr. President," "Professor Jones," "Coach Brown," "Officer Adams," "Dr. Smith, etc.

HAT 16: Disrespect

- Sassing, shouting, cursing, mocking, arguing, interrupting, ignoring, disputing, or challenging those who are in authority
- Teasing in a disrespectful manner.

HAT 16: Disrespect

- disrespect - an expression of lack of respect
 - blasphemy
 - impudence; cheek; impertinence
 - disparagement; depreciation; derogation
 - contempt; scorn
 - ridicule
 - derision
 - abuse; insult; revilement; contumely; vilification

Hatred

- hate, hatred - a feeling of dislike so strong that it demands action
 - Hatred is a feeling
 - Thinking of the object of hate stimulates the emotion
 - Hate or hatred is expressed through:
 - malevolence; malignity
 - hostility; enmity; ill will
 - despising
 - murderousness
 - misogyny; misogamy; misanthropy
 - abhorrence; detestation; loathing

Hatred

- malevolence - the quality of threatening evil, is expressed in:
 - malice - the quality of threatening evil
 - maliciousness; spite - feeling a need to see others suffer
 - diss - treat, mention, or speak to rudely; "He insulted her with his rude remarks"; "the student who had betrayed his classmate was dissed by everyone"
 - insult - a deliberately offensive act or something producing the effect of an affront; "turning his back on me was a deliberate insult"
 - vindictiveness; vengefulness - *a malevolent desire for revenge*

Hatred

- hostility; enmity; ill will, expressed by:
 - resentment; bitterness; rancor
 - belligerence; belligerency
 - aggression; aggressiveness
 - antagonism
 - class feeling
 - animosity; bad blood

Hatred

- resentment; bitterness; rancor
 - a feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
 - Expressed by:
 - envy; enviousness - spite and resentment at seeing the success of another
 - grudge; score; grievance - a resentment strong enough to justify retaliation;
 - a complaint about a (real or imaginary) wrong that causes resentment and is grounds for action

Hatred

- hostility; enmity; ill will is seen as a temptation to belligerence; belligerency - a disposition to fight; hostile or warlike attitude or nature.
- Or, the temptation to aggression; aggressiveness - violent action that is hostile and usually unprovoked; deliberately unfriendly behavior.
 - Often seen as bullying - the act of intimidating a weaker person to make them do something

Hatred

- antagonism
 - an actively expressed feeling of dislike and hostility
- class feeling
 - Feelings of envy and resentment of one social or economic class for toward another.
- animosity; bad blood
 - a feeling of ill will arousing active hostility

HAT 18: Bitterness

- bitter

- 1. a taste that is sharp, acrid, and unpleasant.
- 2. Causing a sharply unpleasant, painful, or stinging sensation; harsh:
- 3. Difficult or distasteful to accept, admit, or bear: the bitter truth; bitter sorrow.
- 4. Proceeding from or exhibiting strong animosity: a bitter struggle; bitter foes.
- 5. Resulting from or expressive of severe grief, anguish, or disappointment: cried bitter tears.
- 6. Marked by resentment or cynicism: “He was already a bitter elderly man with a gray face” (John Dos Passos).

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Bitterness as a noun in the English language means: intensity of suffering of the mind and body; something that is difficult to bear; something that causes animosity and reaction. It is one of the most devastating MAS a person can get into.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Bitter people are arrogant, irrational, inconsiderate of others, withdrawn from society, and indifferent or adverse to conformity with conventional standards of social behavior.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Examples of bitterness:
- 1) Foolish children - Prov 17:25 - A foolish son brings grief to his father and bitterness to the one who bore him.
- 2) Childless women - 1 Sam 1:10 - In bitterness of soul, Hannah wept much and prayed to the LORD.
- 3) 5th Cycle of Discipline - Isa 33:7 - Behold, the brave men cry in the streets, the ambassadors for peace weep bitterly.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Jealousy emanating from Approbation and power lust
 - Acts 8:23 - For I see that you are full of bitterness and captive to sin (Simon tried to buy a spiritual gift).

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Suffering - Job 7:11 - Therefore I will not keep silent; I will speak out in the anguish of my spirit, I will complain in the bitterness of my soul.
- Complaining -
- Job 10:1 - My soul is weary of my life; I will give free course to my complaint; I will speak in the bitterness of my soul.
- Job 23:2 - Even today my complaint is bitter; his hand is heavy in spite of my groaning.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Gossiping - Psa 64:3 - Who have sharpen their tongue like a sword, and have aimed their arrows, even bitter words.
- Jealousy and Strife - James 3:14 - But if you harbor bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast about it or deny the truth.
- Falsely Accusing God - Job 9:17-18 - For he breaks me with a tempest, and multiplies my wounds without cause. He will not allow me to take my breath, but fills me with bitterness.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Forsaking the Lord - Jer 2:19 – 19 - Your own wickedness will correct you, and your backslidings will reprove you: know therefore and see that it is an
- evil thing and a bitterness, that you have forsaken Jehovah your God, and that my fear is not in you, says the Lord, Jehovah of hosts.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Contagious Bitterness -
- Heb 12:15 - See to it that no one misses the grace of God and that no bitter root grows up to cause trouble and defile many.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Bitter people are troublemakers who lack all sense of grace-orientation. They destroy their marriage and all other relationships that they have.
- Col 3:19, "Husbands, love your wives, and stop being bitter against them."

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Eph 4:31 – Remove all bitterness, both anger and wrath, both quarreling and slander, must be removed from you, along with all malice.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Bitterness is the monstrous combination of arrogant and emotional sinning. It results in the self-deception that you are always right and that everyone else is wrong.
- Bitter people seek revenge and try to hurt others at every opportunity. They are implacable. They hold grudges and refuse to forgive others or to accept their apologies. They try to build their happiness on someone else's unhappiness.

HAT 18: Bitterness

- Bitterness falls under the general category of hate, and is expressed because of hostility; enmity; or ill will.
 - Bitterness, also known as resentment or rancor is:
 - a feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
 - This is then seen in one of these forms:
 - envy; enviousness - spite and resentment at seeing the success of another
 - grudge; score; grievance - a resentment strong enough to justify retaliation;
 - a complaint about a (real or imaginary) wrong that causes resentment and is grounds for action

HAT 19: Stubbornness

- Definition – to be obstinate; inflexibly fixed in opinion; not to be moved or persuaded by reason; to obstinately adhere to an opinion, purpose, or course in spite of reason, arguments, or persuasion.

HAT 19: Stubbornness

- Being stubborn is not the same as being persistent, tenacious, or resolute.
- Stubbornness is a close-minded attitude which is motivated by arrogance and pride, whereas persistence, tenacity, and resolve are motivated by reason and character.

HAT 19: Stubbornness

HAT 19: Stubbornness

- stubbornness is the resolute adherence to your own ideas or desires.
- It is the negative side of the trait called resoluteness or firmness:
 - stubbornness is also identified as, bullheadedness, obstinacy, obstinance, pigheadedness, self-will, and results in 2 primary areas:
 - intransigency; intransigence -
 - stubbornly refusing to compromise
 - impenitence -
 - the trait of refusing to repent

HAT 19: Stubbornness

- Our belief in God's Word should be characterized by resoluteness, which is defined by:
 - steadfastness - loyalty in the face of trouble and difficulty
 - determination; purpose - the quality of being determined to do or achieve something;
 - decisiveness; decision - the trait of resoluteness as evidenced by firmness of character or purpose;
 - single-mindedness - characterized by one unified purpose

HAT 19: Stubbornness

- But not by adamance; obduracy; unyieldingness -
 - resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible
- And not by stubbornness, bullheadedness, obstinacy, obstinance, pigheadedness, self-will
 - resolute adherence to your own ideas or desires
